MINUTES AND MEETING NOTES

NEW RESEARCH FOR IRB REVIEW

A new clinical trial was discussed. A widely used and well-tolerated treatment was discussed applied to a certain category of individuals. We discussed mechanism of action, known side effects if any, protocol, patient recruitment, exclusion criteria, duration of study, measurement of

objectives, informed consent, and how to proceed if a patient could no longer continue or wished to stop the study

We discussed whether some signs are monitored or only symptoms. At this point, only self-reported symptoms will be assessed.

There was a motion to approve, and it was seconded.

The motion passed, and the researcher has the approval of the IRB for his study.

A CASE SERIES

A doctor discussed his experience treating patients with a particular condition. In all, no fewer than nine different ways of treating this same condition, in which patients' symptoms resolved, were discussed at the meeting.

Decision of group: This doctor shall please continue this research as a case series, using the materials best suited to each patient and their presentation. Then in November, please return and let us know how they are doing, and what treatments were found to be most helpful.

MYOPIA CLINICAL STUDY

One doctor discussed a self-imposed study that literally and figuratively groped blindly toward its current status over 14 years. Over this time, the working hypothesis evolved and has now guided the current practice.

This study will be continued and expanded to patients seeking this treatment. Suggestions were made also regarding other methods of treating myopia.
